For large quantities of water to brewers, distillers, and for other uses not specified under specific regulations for determining the quantity, when the estimated average quantity consumed is less than five hundred gallons per day, for each one hundred gallons estimated daily consumption, the sum of \$5 per month

When the quantity used is more than five hundred gallons and less than one thousand gallons per day, for each one hundred gallons estimated daily consumption, the sum of \$4 per month.

When the quantity used is more than one thousand and less than two thousand gallons per day, for each hundred gallons estimated daily consumption, the sum of \$3 per month

No person will be allowed to use the water for wetting brick or for making mortar or plaster, or for any building purpose, until an application has been made for the same, and a statement made of the number of thousand brick to be used, or square yards of plaster to be put on.

No person taking the water shall supply any other person or family with the same, or allow any other person or family to use such water without first paying the rent in advance for such family or person, or an arrangement made with the owner or his agent for permission for such person or family to use the same.

Each and every person using the water shall keep his, her, or their service pipes, stop-cocks, and other water apparatus, in good repair, and at their own expense, and prevent any unnecessary waste of water.

The use of water for fountains will not be allowed to flow where it can be used for other purposes, and when known to be used for other purposes, such fountains will be closed.

No person will be allowed to use the water for any other purpose than those embraced in the application made at the time of applying for the permit to use the same.

A permit to use the water in a dwelling, store, restaurant, hotel, &c., does not give any permission to use the water for any other purpose than those embraced in the license where payment is made for the month's rent, and a charge will be made in all cases where the water is used for other purposes than those embraced in a permit or license.

Why Not Rebuild With Brick?

The calamity of yesterday, affords another unmistakable proof of the fact that no town in California composed in part of wooden buildings, is, or can be exempt from the dreaded visitation of the fearful scourge that has chosen as its last victim the "gem of the foothills." The experience of the past ten years demonstrates the fact that there is no exemption from conflagrations in the dry climate of California. The only thing that can be accomplished to prevent the total destruction of the town in the future, is to erect as far as far as possible, fire proof buildings.

Notwithstanding the fact that brick buildings do not always afford successful resistance to the flames when surrounded with buildings composed of combustible material, no serious conflagration can occur in a town where a large proportion of the buildings are of fire proof material. Would it not be policy for those who own eligible building lots, to make an effort to build of brick, stone, or concrete?—anything in fact that will not add fuel to a fire when once kindled. Especially should this be the case in the business portion of the town. To render this as economical as possible the owners of adjacent lots should combine, and erect buildings together, with substantial partition walls.

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It is unnecessary to erect large and magnificent brick buildings at the present time. Let them be as economical as possible, but substantial and durable. Additions can be made afterwards as business may require and means afford. Let those who contemplate building, think well of this matter before erecting food for future conflagrations.

One half of a concrete building on Montgomery street, with nothing but ordinary wooden doors, was saved by the exertions of the occupant, while the adjoining half which was unoccupied was completely destroyed. The doors and windows are half burned up. Having no water, the occupant, a French liquor dealer, saved his half of the building by a free use of claret and syrups. We mention this circumstance as showing how easy it is to preserve such buildings from destruction by fire. Would it not be better to incur a little more expenso and erect buildings of more durable material than wood?

Thieves.

Eighteen fire plunderers were lodged in jail yesterday. They each deserve fifty lashes.

Hedges & Hannon's Banking House.

The Brick building occupied by this firm, was destroyed by the fire, nothing but the bare walls are left standing. The building had not been furnished with iron shutters. Their large vault remained true to its trust—preserving everything it contained without injury, while the inside of the building was being consumed upon and around it. They have returned to their former quarters in Washington Block, corner of Myers and Montgomery streets.

Emery & Co., have removed their Banking House to the fire proof building on Bird street, next door to the Record office. The buildings formerly occupied by them disappeared in a twinkling before the devastating scourge. Their safe, we believe, performed its duty satisfactorily. A long tailed Chinaman was busily engaged yesterday morning with a rocker, washing the dirt whereon their building had stood. We did not see his prospect.

The streets during the day yesterday presented a very disorderly appearance, being filled with lumber, goods, and gazers at the smouldering embers. So far our citizens have met the results of the catastrophe in the true California spirit. Board and canvas buildings have been reared, lots enclosed, as a warning to squatters, and material for rebuilding scattered along at different locations. Nothing can conquer the indomitable energy of Californians. They rise superior to all temporary afflictions.

The Conflagration.

We have endeavored to collect a few data concerning the fire, but everything is in such disorder that we find it almost impossible to arrange a comprehensible account or an accurate estimate of the losses. From what we could pick up yesterday from losers and from the town assessment list we have made up the following:

In the above, we have not essayed anything more than a general "rough guess" at figures, and large as it is, have made a very incomplete list of the losses. There are very many tenants and sub-tenants who have escaped our notice, and subtracting these from the really under-estimated sum total, and we are quite sure that the aggregate of our figuring is much less than the real amount lost.
