Ehmann Home Rehabilitation Project



Old buildings, which are such a vital part of BCHS, need constant work to maintain them. With limited funds, this can present challenges. In order to keep ahead of the curve, it has been determined that roof and other building inspections are a necessity so that the distribution of available dollars is more efficient.

There are already plans in place to do significant work on the Ehmann Home over the next five years and, possibly longer, depending on the extent of repairs needed and availability of funds.

To date we have approved expenditure of approximately 3,000 dollars for termite control and 9,000 dollars to replace the damaged pipes that provide water to the home This includes removal and replacement of a section of City sidewalk. These repairs should allow us to re-open the downstairs of the home for regularly scheduled tours and some events. The next phase will tackle the larger problems.

Our goal in this fundraising campaign is to raise 100,000 dollars. These funds will begin the process of rehabilitating the home to the extent that the upstairs could be re-opened. The funds will be used for:

- Professional assessment of our interior plumbing and electrical needs.
- Assessment of the number of windows that need to be repaired or replaced.
- To the extent possible, an evaluation of termite damage and dry rot that needs to be remediated. It is nearly impossible to put a number on the cost of these repairs until the walls are actually opened.
- Development of plans and engineering for the repairs and Matching funds for grants to assist in this process and aid in purchase of materials for repairs.

The Research Corner

City directories are one of the most used reference sources at the Archives. I was reminded of that this past week when I fielded a question asking about the names of the 5 and 10 cent stores in downtown Oroville in the 1950s. A brother and sister were fairly sure that they were Rasco's and Ben Franklin, but they wanted confirmation for a personal reminiscence. The city directory provided that. This led to a further question from the same party regarding the businesses that occupied the area where the Oroville Raley's is now located. Previously Currier Bros. (Raley's predecessor in Oroville) was located in a different position on the property. A check of the city directory revealed that Gibson's Pharmacy, Woolworth's, a beauty salon, a coin laundromat, and Gallenkamp's Shoes were arrayed down one side of the lot. Over the passage of time it can become difficult to remember exactly what was located where when the building configuration has changed.

And then there is the issue of changing street names. A frequent one involves the former name of Oro Dam Blvd. in Oroville. Obviously that wasn't always its name. Those who moved to this area after the development of Oroville Dam frequently don't realize that until the mid-1960s what we know as Oro Dam didn't exist between Lincoln Blvd. and the Marysville Highway (now Feather River Blvd.) The Richter brothers bulldozed the road in, and development quickly followed.

As I've mentioned in a previous article, city directories are ideal for locating people. Early city directories provide not only names, but also occupations. Husbands and wives are generally both included, in addition to adult children living in the family home. The directories can help track the arrival or departure of individuals from an area, particularly in the ten year period between censuses. So don't forget city directories for help with both business and family research. The Archives has a significant collection covering multiple decades. Unfortunately, the earliest directory wasn't published until 1907. There is an 1881 directory, but it has very limited information.

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
