Marilyn Cochran

The Research Corner By Nancy Brower

Occasionally an intriguing item shows up at the Archives that seems to demand further investigation. In this case it was a photo postcard of an elegant Spanish style building with the words "Feather Lodge" and "Oroville District" printed on it. The questions were "where was this building located" and "does it still exist." A quick check in Newspapers.com unearthed an article indicating that Dr. Rufus David, a physician from Los Angeles, purchased the Feather Lodge in April 1932. The article further revealed



that the property had previously been owned by Associated Realty Owners and consisted of 32 acres which were planted with hundreds of Washington navel orange trees. The property was described as being located on a bluff overlooking the Feather River. Further investigation showed that it was utilized as a location for special parties through the 1930s.

This was all intriguing, but led to questions about who the Associated Realty Owners were and why they had built the Lodge. Nancy Negri kindly checked the records at the Butte County Hall of Records and located the deed for the sale to Rufus David and additional information about the property. The Associated Realty Owners were a real estate group from Los Angeles who decided to purchase land in the Oroville area and then promote it to Southern California citrus growers. Consequently, they obtained all of the unsold lands of the J.M. Ward Estate in the Oroville Wyandotte Fruitlands. This area is on the east side of Olive Highway in the vicinity of Lake Oroville.

One of the major figures in the Associated Realty Owners was Rolden Borden. In 1929 he stated "We have faith in the growth of the Oroville District as a citrus producing district, and we want to see it grow and help it grow." The Feather Lodge was built in 1928 for the comfort and entertainment of the would-be investors. Additionally, Borden and his associates hired a pilot to ferry investors from Los Angeles to Oroville. Among these was Brother Isaiah, who subsequently decided to relocate his colony to the area. The realty group promoted the Oroville area with a film called "Golden Streams" that was widely shown. They also produced an extensive booklet that extolled the value of planting citrus and avocado groves in the Oroville foothills and distributed 20,000 copies.

Unfortunately, the Realty group had apparently created a financial quagmire for themselves. Either they were unable to sell enough property or else they had grossly underestimated their finances. This was likely why they decided to sell the Feather Lodge to Dr. David. By the end of 1932, the group appeared prominently in legal notices related to unpaid taxes and delinquent mortgages.

The Lodge became a private residence, and various people lived there over the years. It was purchased by Harold and Barbara Hund in the early 1960s and remains in the family. So, the answers to the earlier questions are that it still exists and is located just off Canyon Drive.
